7 water clarity test intakes at different stages of the summer season and 3 water intakes.

Letters to new owners and real estate agents advising them that the City of Mont-Tremblant's board of directors has approved our initiative on the regulation of motorized boats following our survey.

Meeting on July 30, 2019 with Yanick Laporte and Steve Laroche, administrators of the ALD, a new association made up of boat people, including Karl Mansour, Michel Archambault, Louis-Pier Deslauriers and Michel Sicotte are also directors. The discussion focused on the installation of the ski course and making it a wake zone and telling boaters who would use canoes, kayaks, boards etc. to avoid this area when they use it. We concluded that they put a simple rope with three buoys. On the other hand, they had to confirm in writing what they want to do, how and why. To date we have only received a code of ethics, which is not accepted, the association of the owners of Lake Duhamel already has a code of ethics that was voted on June 20, 2015

On August 7, 2019, the prosecutors in the ALD's file sent the Lac Duhamel Owners Association a formal notice alleging that the association was carrying out propaganda based on false and misleading information with the aim of convince its members to ban certain types of boats. We have forwarded the file to the assigned prosecutor. This file is still active and we will not be making any comments at this time.

Purchase of 15-inch buoys that would better define the wave-free area as well as the areas affected by milfoil.

Request from Mr. Marcoux to obtain signs on the obligation to wash boats and the fines imposed on boat owners and owners authorizing boat entrances.

Preparation for the summer meeting. A total of 39 people participated.

Management of a court file of a resident who complained about the age of the lookout during a wake session.

Letter asking for clarification of the age of the lookout which contains a blurring around the required age.

Regarding the milfoil, the board of directors is exploring various avenues to eradicate this invasive but non-toxic plant.

Verification of our asphaltting request. The city has voted the budget and some roads will be made around the lake this year, although priorities and dates have not yet been set.

Meeting with the owners to strengthen the by-law imposed by the City of Mont-Tremblant on the washing of motorized or non-motorized watercrafts. Fines for non-compliance range from \$500 to \$4,000 depending on whether it is a first offence or a repeat offence for a natural or legal person. We ask them to be vigilant and to restrict the entry of boats into their land.

Discussions on the possibility of trout seeding.

RRVUB Vincent Causse confirmed that the file was entrusted to the CRE and the consultations started on May 30, 2020

Following a complaint from a resident who noticed the presence of algae in front of Mr. Leduc's house and photos were taken and sent to Mr. Vincent Causse, Director, Environment Service. He confirmed that these were not toxic algae and recommended Madame Létourneau, biologist, to perform the analysis. Analysis confirms that these are not toxic algae. However, Madame Létourneau confirms the degradation of the lake's banks and the quality of the water.
